Focus: calling us to overcome evil with good by loving our enemies

## Discussion

- Allow people to share a story of someone that they felt like would fall into the category of "enemy" (i.e. someone who is against them). Encourage them to keep their "actual enemies" in mind as you discuss this passage.
- Read Rom. 12.14-21. In your own words, what is Paul's "big idea" in this section?
- Make a list of all the positive commands Paul gives and another list of all the negative prohibitions he gives. Which one(s) are most challenging for you personally (especially in light of any enemy-ish relationships you may currently have). What makes this so very hard to obey?
- What supporting/strengthening teachings does Paul give that help us obey this idea of loving our enemies? Which one do you most need to cling to?
- What questions or "but-what-abouts" does this passage raise for you? Do any of those need to be addressed before you can obey this passage's main teaching about enemies?
- Spend time in prayer for those who are in enemy-like relationships. You may want to spend time in prayer for our brothers and sisters around the world who are being persecuted for their faith, too.
